Reflect

- Discovering who the artist is.
- Finding out what type of artist they are.
- Learning about what inspires them and why they do what they do...
- Opportunity to share the artists work with them.


- Responding to their art by commenting if they like their style of music or artwork and discussing their feelings with it.
- Discussing feelings linking to the piece of art.

- Having a go at imitating their artwork.
- Trying out some of the techniques the artist may have used.
- Planning their work in detail.
- Helps having a starting point.
- Children can see
 what elements
 they may use off
 the artist and
 what they will
 include of their
 own idea.
- Allowing them freedom on what they want to add to their artwork, let them add a twist if they want to.
- Letting their imagination take them and being able to see if their final piece is what they had planned.
- Building in time to look back on their art is helping them to become a reflective learner.
- Think about what went well and even better if.

Printmaking – Learning a New Skill



- Georgina makes digital prints to create multiple copies of the same image. By learning print making, you understand how art can be shared with more people.
- Printmaking encourages us to simplify our designs using clear shapes and lines.
 Georgina Westley uses block colours, simple lines and no unnecessary details.



Printmaking Practice – Demonstration & Instructions

Technique: Pencil control

- Divide your page into 6 using a ruler and pencil.
- You have three styrofoam squares each.

On each styrofoam square:

- Draw a circle
- Draw a rectangle
- Draw wavy lines

Make two prints of each styrofoam square on your page

Technique: Paint layering

Styrofoam 1

 Cut out the circle and print a different colour.

Styrofoam 2

 Cut out the Rectangle and print a different colour.

Styrofoam 3

 Cut out some wavy lines and print a different colour.



Creating your first print.

TECHNIQUE

11cm

- Draw lightly with your pencil –
 sketch first.
- Use a ruler for the sides and underneath of tube.
- Write London backwards underneath if you can!











First print: Red and Blue Ink

• TECHNIQUE

- Trace your drawing onto styrofoam.
- Red roller paint print!
- Wash and dry styrofoam
- Blue roller paint... print!
- Wash and dry styrofoam
- Green roller paint...print!

Second Print

- Cut out the tube part of your styrofoam.
- Roll paint onto the styrofoam and print on top of your first tube print.
- Wash and dry styrofoam.
- Roll a different colour paint onto the styrofoam, and print on your second tube print.
- Repeat instructions for third tube print.





F1 Themed Picture

- Choose an F1 themed picture to etch into your styrofoam.
- Paint a thin layer of paint onto your foam – try not to paint the white cracks.
- Press and print!



Georgina Westley - Transport






- Can you draw a tube train, car or aeroplane into the styrofoam?
