Safe Routes to School

Our school access points face pressure at the start and end of the school day as is the case at many schools. We have worked to ensure the spread of drop off and pick up points to reduce congestion as much as possible and are working with the Local Authority to develop a third entranceway into school to help alleviate congestion further.

We would like to ask for you to drop your child/ren at school considerately. We have seen parents stopping and in some cases parking on yellow zig zags, letting children leave the cars into the main road and parking in accessible parking bays without the necessary badge. Thank you for thinking carefully about where you stop, drop off your child and park around the site.



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

Universal Free School Meals

Since September, all children in Reception classes across Wales have been able to have free meals at school, and from April Universal Primary Free School Meals will be rolled out to all year 1 and 2 pupils in Wrexham as well.

This is the second stage of the Welsh Government's response to the rising cost-of-living pressures on families, tackling child poverty and ensuring no child goes hungry in school. The same offer will be available to years 3 to 6 from September 2023.

Does your child already receive Free School Meals?

If your child currently receives Free School Meals based on your circumstances, you may also be entitled to additional help through the Pupil Development Grant, which includes financial support for uniform, sports equipment and devices. To access this year's scheme visit Pupil Development Grant (PDG) | Wrexham County Borough Council.

Has your financial situation changed in the last year?

If your child is not currently receiving Free School Meals, but your circumstances have changed this year, Wrexham might have support available for you. To check if you are eligible for Free School Meals, visit Free <u>school meals | Wrexham County Borough Council</u>. If you are eligible, you may also be able to receive the Pupil Development Grant.

As the summer term approaches, we are urging parents and carers to apply for the support they're entitled to.

Smart Watches

We have seen an increase in pupils coming to school wearing Smart Watches recently. Whilst we all understand how useful these are, there have been incidents where these have rang in class or where they have been damaged at playtimes. We will be asking pupils to remove these watches coming into class and handing these to teachers. This is the same as we do with the mobile phones our older pupils who walk to and from school bring into school.
