Statement of Intent

All Saints' School is committed to ensuring that every pupil makes excellent progress and reaches their full potential, regardless of background or circumstance. We aim to provide an inclusive and supportive environment where all pupils thrive academically, socially, and emotionally. Our vision is that every child will become ambitious and capable learners, enterprising and creative contributors, ethical and informed citizens, and healthy, confident individuals who strive to be the very best they can be.

The Pupil Development Grant (PDG) is used purposefully to support disadvantaged pupils by reducing barriers to learning, narrowing the attainment gap, and ensuring equity of opportunity for all. By investing in high-quality teaching and learning, we focus on the areas where disadvantaged pupils require the most input and support. We recognise that the strategies we adopt not only benefit those pupils in receipt of PDG but also enhance the learning experience for all pupils at All Saints' School.

In order to support this strategy and ensure approaches are impactful, we will:

Objectives

1. Ensure the wellbeing and emotional resilience of all pupils at All Saints' School I promoted in everything that we do.
2. Promote equity of provision for all pupils across the school.
3. Improve progress for pupils, especially those identified as eFSM, by ensuring that they receive appropriate support to achieve from their starting points.
4. Ensure all pupils, particularly those in Early Years, are school ready, implementing identification strategies and appropriate intervention to address individual needs.
5. Support the proactive tracking of pupils' progress and needs to support realisation of the above.

Activities to include

1. Allocation of time and resource to ensure the accurate and proactive tracking of identified pupils to ensure their progress is secured.
2. To provide intervention support for identified pupils to support their school readiness.
3. Provide additional speech and language support for identified pupils, with a focus on those eFSM.
4. Provision of the Wellbeing & Engagement Manager to support identified pupils and families.
5. Provision of the school Therapist through Action for Children to ensure access to appropriate support for pupils who require this.
6. Ensure that learning support provision across the school supports effective intervention and securing of pupil progress, with a focus on transition.

(Small Steps Plans)
<p>All pupils, particularly in Early Years, are "school ready" with key foundational skills developed.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Early Years baseline assessments show improvement in targeted areas for identified pupils. (MIS Tracking) - Speech and language assessments evidence improved communication skills for pupils accessing support. (MIS Tracking) - Fewer children require long-term high-level interventions due to timely support in Early Years. (MIS Tracking and Baseline)
